The very, very latest update on Stewart's Shop on Genesee St

On Monday, November 28th, the Scenic & Historic Preservation District Commission met to review the Stewart's Shops proposal to build a gas station and store on the site of the old Raspberries restaurant, at 2634 Genesee St. Their plan involved demolishing the house at 2632 Genesee St. in order to

combine the two parcels and build their store on a corner. The Commission is authorized to give or deny permission to demolish any building in the District. They had a brief discussion, then I was allowed two minutes to speak, as the Councilmember representing the district. Then they voted 3-2 AGAINST giving a permit to demolish that building. This is important. Nonetheless, because they are a Commission, the Planning Board has the final authority to either approve or disapprove the proposal from Stewart's. The Planning Board can override the Commission's denial of a permit to demolish 2632 Genesee St. So the case is not over yet.

Next, Stewart's will be going to a Zoning Board of Appeals meeting on Tuesday, December 20th at 5pm, held in Council Chambers at City Hall They are going before the Board to request three separate area variances. First they are requesting a variance for the width of one lot. The zone, Neighborhood Mixed Use, allows a maximum of 100 feet width for lots, and Stewart's is asking for a variance to allow a width of 180 feet. Second, they are asking for a considerably larger setback. Our Zoning Ordinance says that setbacks should be the average of the street, but they are asking for a setback that is much farther back than the average. And third, they are requesting a variance for the width of their storefront. Whereas our Code allows buildings in Neighborhood Mixed Use Zones to be up to 60 feet wide, they are asking to build a storefront that would be 75 feet wide. So, in three distinct ways, Stewart's wants to build a gas station and store that will require three variances. So it will be up to the Zoning Board of Appeals to decide whether they should be allowed to do that. Importantly, the Planning Board CANNOT override the Zoning Board of Appeals. I will be there on Tuesday, and plan to speak. I encourage others to do so as well, whether you are for or against the Stewart's proposal.

Note: all meetings of the Zoning Board of Appeals are public hearings. This means that they will be calling on the public to speak for or against any of the variances before them. Anyone can come and speak at this meeting.

Next, depending on the outcome of the Zoning Board of Appeals meeting, Stewart's will be back before the Planning Board in January.



A White Winter Means Snow Removal

I've heard it said: "If you choose not to find joy in the snow, you will have less joy in your life, but the same amount of snow." Some of us love the snow, some of us hate it, and some of us even fly to other parts of the country to avoid it. But in any case, there will be snow. Please be mindful of the fact that sidewalks need to be available and accessible to everyone year round. (For some of our neighbors, sidewalks are their main form of transportation.) Please clear your sidewalk within 24 hours of a snow fall. And if (when?) we get a big storm, do your best to stay off the roads altogether, so that our DPW crew can fully clear the roads as quickly as possible. And in the case of a snow emergency, absolutely keep your car anywhere but on the street.

Last year, Codes was out in force in South Utica issuing citations for property owners who did not clear their sidewalks promptly enough. They will be out there again as soon as there is enough snow to warrant it.




Photo: a flyer of a Toy Drive and event at the Parkway Rec Center, Sunday, December 18th - featuring a jolly Teddy Bear!

Support Utica Businesses and Make Us All Proud

The City's Department of Urban & Economic Development recently released a brand new APP that helps you support local businesses AND get rewards while you do so. The APP is called "Utica Proud" and is easy to find and free to download. Just download it to your phone or mobile device. Once it is downloaded, it is easy to set up. This will mean linking it to a credit card or bank account, just as you would with lots of other APPs (such as Venmo, CashApp). Once you set it up, you can start using it at any of many local Utica participating businesses. You will receive rewards as you go ("Half Moons"!) which you can cash in for discounts. So our local businesses get more of our dollars, and you get rewards for shopping through the APP.



Complete Streets - Genesee from Cottage Place to Oriskany Blvd

Complete Streets is an important idea whose time has finally come for Utica. The basic idea of Complete Streets is that streets should accommodate all forms of transportation that humans use to move around: bikes, walking, public transportation, and cars. (Read all about Complete Streets here.) So, rather than making streets just for cars and forcing other forms of transportation to compete with those cars, Complete Streets makes room for everyone. Complete Streets are safer and more equitable. People in Utica have been advocating for Complete Streets for at least a decade. And in 2016, the Common Council passed a Complete Street policy, which was at the time championed by Samantha Colosimo-Testa. A couple of years ago, the Mayor did a very small trial run of a Complete Streets redesign south of Oneida Square. They put Genesee on a "diet", meaning narrowing the traffic to a single lane in each direction, and added bike lanes and turning lanes. The City ran a survey, and the results were overwhelmingly positive. But the Council at the time shot it down. So that trial run, which the public approved of, didn't go anywhere

Now it is time to try again. On October 19th, Katie Aiello introduced a Resolution

to authorize the Mayor to conduct a trial run of Complete Streets on the section of Genesee from Cottage Place to Oriskany Blvd. Frank Meola and I joined her as co-sponsors. (The section of Genesee from Oneida Square to Cottage Place is already almost a Complete Street. It became so when we changed Oneida Square into Oneida Circle.) The time is now because this section of Genesee has just been repayed and needs to be striped anyway. (The only physical change involved in this instance is to place the stripes in different places than they were before.) The Council as a whole disagreed. Some members really believed that our Resolution should go to Committee. But others (including me) argued that after years and years of debating the merits of Complete Streets, the time had come to give it a try. Councilmembers DiBrango, Betrus, Williams, and Colosimo-Testa made a motion to place the Resolution in Committee. We voted on that motion and it failed. We then moved for a vote on the Resolution itself, and it passed, 5 to 4. Again, DiBrango, Betrus, Williams, and Colosimo-Testa voted against allowing the City to move forward with Complete Streets, even as a temporary trial run.

The trial run will last for at least 90 days. So you can expect to hear more from me about this soon. To learn much more about this now, just head over to Katie's website, where she has it all mapped out. (You get it? "Mapped out"!)




Photo: an illustration of Complete Streets on Genesee, with cars, bikes, pedestrians. Katie Aiello made this graphic for us!

Here are all my votes in November. All votes described below were unanimous unless otherwise noted. But, of course, if there is more you'd like to understand, please let me know.

Ordinance Accepting Property in Harbor Point:

The Council voted to accept from the Harbor Point Development Corporation property that the City will use to create a public street.



Report from E&A - November - December 2022

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is a five person Board, on which I serve, that oversees the day-to-day budget operations of the City. All transfers of monies from one area of the budget to another must be approved by E&A, as well as all expenditures of supplemental monies that come into the City, as well as any and all changes to the Table of Organization, which lists all employees of the City. E&A is also authorized to settle lawsuits brought against the City.

Listing every transfer we make is turning out to be very time consuming. So from here on out, I will give a general summary of the work of E&A, and also provide a link where all of the minutes of E&A can be found.

E&A has met six times since my last Newsletter: November 10th, 14th, 21st, December 1st, 5th, and 12th. The Board has run the full gamut of its various responsibilities. We've made budgetary transfers, amended the Table of Organization, allocated supplemental appropriations, approved of agreements between the City and CSEA, and authorized Corporation Counsel to make offers to settle lawsuits.
